HONORS

Honors levels indicated in the program are preliminary, and may change once final grades are calculated.

For Latin Honors, calculation of the cumulative grade point average is based on all work attempted in college, at least 52 hours of which must be from Southern Wesleyan University. Latin Honors are designated as follows:

Summa Cum Laude (with highest praise), indicated by an honor medallion and a double gold honor cord, denotes a cumulative collegiate GPA of 3.80 or above.

Magna Cum Laude (with high praise), indicated by a double gold honor cord, denotes a cumulative collegiate GPA of 3.60 to 3.79.

Cum Laude (with praise), indicated by a single gold honor cord, denotes a cumulative collegiate GPA of 3.40 to 3.59.

In the event that a student is ineligible for Latin Honors but has achieved a cumulative Southern Wesleyan University grade point average of at least 3.8 on no less than 60 credits earned at Southern Wesleyan University, that student will be assigned the designation of **University Honors.** University Honors are indicated by a single white honor cord.

Graduation from the **Southern Wesleyan University Honors Program**, indicated by a gold stole, requires 18 semester hours of honors credit and completion of an honors project. **Major Honors** requires completion of an honors project and is indicated by a white stole.

AΣΛ denotes membership in Alpha Sigma Lambda, a national honor society open to the top ten percent of students over 25 years of age who have at least 24 credits in a baccalaureate program, a minimum grade point average of 3.2, and have completed at least 12 credits at Southern Wesleyan University. Membership is indicated by deep burgundy and antique gold honor cords.

Aχ denotes membership in Alpha Chi Honor Society, open to the top ten percent of the senior class in the traditional program. The name is derived from the initial letters of $\alpha\lambda\eta\theta$ εια (truth) and $\chi\alpha\rho\alpha\kappa\tau\eta\rho$ (character). Membership is indicated by blue and green honor cords.

ΣΤΔ denotes membership in Sigma Tau Delta, the international English honor society, open to English majors at the sophomore level and above who have a 3.0 and are in the top 35 percent of their class. The motto of the fraternity, for which the Greek letters stand, is "Sincerity, Truth, and Design." Membership is indicated by black and red honor cords.

The Faculty Marshal is the highest ranking faculty member with the most years of service to the University. The Student Marshal has the highest collegiate grade point average in the traditional program junior class. Ushers are academic leaders from the traditional program junior class and staff members of Southern Wesleyan University.

THE ACADEMIC PROCESSIONAL AND AMERICAN ACADEMIC REGALIA

The formality of the academic processional is rooted in history dating back to the 12^{th} and 13^{th} centuries. Custom and tradition evolved into a code adopted by the American Council on Education. This code is observed today by many institutions of higher education throughout the United States. The processional and other aspects of today's ceremony reflect that code. The Academic Processional is led by the Faculty Marshal. The honor of serving as the Faculty Marshal, and Mace Bearer, is bestowed upon the senior-ranking Southern Wesleyan University faculty member.

The style of each academic gown indicates the highest degree earned by the wearer: bachelors—long, pointed sleeves; masters—long, closed sleeves with the arm going through a slit, giving the appearance of short-sleeves; doctors—full, round, and open, with three bars of velvet on each sleeve. The bars may be black or the color designating the major discipline. The academic hood is an ornamental fold that goes around the neck and hangs down the back of the gown. The hood is lined in the official colors of the university that awarded the degree; the color of the facing indicates the degree. Holders of all degrees wear caps with a long tassel conforming to the degree earned, except that doctors may wear tassels of gold thread.

The Academic Mace

The ceremonial mace carried by Southern Wesleyan's Faculty Marshal represents the heritage, values and authority of the university. This piece of academic tradition has its roots in two separate ancient implements. First, the royal scepter represented the lawful power and regal authority of the king. Second, the club-like mace was a common implement of medieval warfare often used by bishops who were forbidden to use the sword. In the medieval period, royal bodyguards often carried a mace to protect the monarch in processions. By the I4th century, the mace was primarily used ceremonially preceding persons of great importance and was highly decorated.

The first recorded use of the ceremonial academic mace dates back to 1385 at the University of Vienna. Since that time it has been common for this symbol of authority to be carried in front of academic processions and to be placed on stage whenever degrees are granted.

The Southern Wesleyan University mace was crafted of cherry in 2008 by Tom Boley, a woodworker and artist from Purcellville, Virginia. At the top of the mace is placed the seal of Southern Wesleyan University depicting the lamp of knowledge, the scroll of Scriptures, a book representing the learning of scholarship, and the entry way of Grimes Hall, an important building from the university's past. All these symbols are placed with the cross of Christ at their center.

Beneath the seal are three rings representing the Trinity, followed by the Latin phrase, *Soli Deo Gloria*, meaning "glory to God alone." The four rings that follow represent the university's emphasis on Faith, Knowledge, Character, and Stewardship.

This mace represents the connection between our faculty of the present, those who have gone before and those yet to come. It is a symbol that reminds us that despite the passing of time, the influence of men and women called to teach never fades.
