General Information

Registration

Complete a separate registration form for each course that you desire to take. Registration forms must be received four weeks prior to the class start date. (See specific date on schedule.)

Materials Information

Some courses may use E-Books; text access information will be posted to the course site in Canvas approximately two weeks prior to the start of class. For courses using printed materials, books will be shipped via UPS to the address on your registration form. We must have a street address on your registration form; UPS will not deliver to a post office box. If other shipping arrangements need to be made, it is your responsibility to indicate this on your registration form.

Course syllabi will be available on Canvas (accessed via mySWU) approximately two weeks prior to the course start date.

MGMT 2203 The Strategic Role of Human Resources

A study of the place human resources occupies in the structure of an organization. Focuses on effective ways to increase the influence of human resources to better meet an organization's human-resources needs and to improve organizational skills. 3 credits (Elective)

PHSC 1544 Introduction to Physical Science

A general study of chemistry, physics, astronomy and earth science. Laboratory included. 4 credits (Elective or Lab Science Requirement)

CPSC 1203 Introduction to the Internet, Online Research, and Web-Site Design

Topics include the history, evolution, structure, and management of the Internet; the influence of the Internet on society; locating and synthesizing information online; Hypertext Markup Language; and building web pages. 3 credits (Elective)

BIBL 3503 The Gospel of John

An inductive study of the Fourth Gospel. Special attention will be given to Johannine theology and the unique characteristics of this non-synoptic gospel. 3 credits (Elective; New Testament General Education Requirement for students enrolled after August 1, 2011; or meets BIBL or RELG/PHIL/BIBL requirement for students enrolled prior to August 2011)

SOSC 2183 Human Diversity and Global Conflict

This course explores the nature of ethnic, racial, class, gender and religious forms of conflict from an anthropological and historical perspective and examines why these differences lead to conflict. 3 credits (Elective)

MGMT 2303 Employment Practices

A study of the practice and function of the traditional human resources areas of recruitment, interviewing, orientation, and internal staffing. Students examine human resources' responsibility for ensuring that employee practices meet the organization's long-term strategic plans for staffing requirements. Also addressed are issues related to compliance with state and federal employment laws and regulations. 3 credits (Elective)

HIST 3103 History of the South to Reconstruction

The development of the American South from its origins to Reconstruction. Covers social, cultural, political, and military history, including the "Road to Disunion." 3 credits (Elective or History General Education Requirement)

PSYC 3153 Abnormal Psychology in Children

Examines the developmental course of abnormal psychology with a special interest in disorders of childhood. Etiology, assessment and treatment options are explored. 3 credits (Elective)
