




PARTICIPANTS ON SWU DAY OF SERVICE

BUILDING BRIDGES – UNDER A BRIDGE


Kevin Carter and his team are building bridges in Greensboro, N.C.

Although they aren't engineers, they are building bridges in a figurative sense as they reach out to the city's homeless, meeting them quite literally where they are. Carter and his wife, Joy, founded 16 Cents Ministry, so named for an experience they had at a local mission when Joy gave a poor woman a food package. The woman handed Joy 16 cents in return for the food she received. This simple act of gratitude also reminded Carter of the story of the widow's mite in Mark 12: 41-44. 16 Cents began traveling weekly to as many as 15 places where the homeless were camped, but now they focus on a weekly time of food and worship under a highway bridge. A 2011 Religion graduate of Southern Wesleyan University, Carter credits his

professors and classmates for helping him to grow spiritually and to see the needs around him with a new perspective.

"I tagged along with my friend, Matt Beasley, and my life changed while serving green beans." Carter helped Beasley, also a SWU student, with Miracle Hill Mission in Greenville. Each time he went there, God opened his eyes and led him to love people outside the church walls. Whenever he came home from SWU for breaks, Carter and some likeminded friends hit the streets of his hometown.

"I started ministering to five people I knew and it grew slowly to where it's at today," Carter said. "An important part of the ministry is meeting people where they are. We don't give them money, but find a way to meet their need."



"In the process, it's God stepping in to give me the vision and enlightenment. We started developing a service under the bridge; then it turned into full-blown worship, music, prayer and a message," he said. They also serve a hot meal while there. During the services, various individuals share testimonies of how Christ transformed their lives.

Volunteers from Faith Wesleyan Church in Greensboro provided the core of 16 Cents. Each Saturday, a different area church "adopts" a night to conduct a service for the homeless. While they already get outside support, Carter would like to see the ministry become an independent nonprofit organization encompassing more area churches and expand into different communities someday.

"We want to bring the churches of Greensboro together," Carter said. "There are so many mom and pop ministries – we can bring them together and do this well on a weekly basis."

SWU TEAM HELPS WITH SANDY RELIEF

The road to recovery for New Yorkers following Superstorm Sandy is a long one, but a group of Southern Wesleyan University students and alumni rolled up their sleeves to move them closer to a normal life.

Southern Wesleyan partnered with three Wesleyan churches and Poured Out Ministries to assist in the relief effort, spending a week helping New York City area residents impacted by Sandy. The SWU team was led by Dave Tolan, missions mobilizer, and Joy Bryant, director of alumni and constituent relations. Students Madison Busch and Caroline Wood of Liberty, S.C.; Will Henderson of Brevard, N.C.; and Joshua Tolan of Six Mile, S.C. traveled to New York City Jan. 6. Joining them were skilled home contractors from Denton Wesleyan Church in Denton, N.C., led by Pastor Charlie Collins, a 1989 religion graduate. Poured Out Ministries provided much-needed tools and supplies.

"Not knowing how to rebuild houses really stretched me outside of my comfort zone," said Henderson, a senior religion major. "Whether it is rebuilding a basement, striking up a conversation with a stranger on the subway, or giving away bags of food, each activity showed the love of Jesus to the community."

"Working with SWU alumni and the SWU students was very rewarding. The days were long and the work was challenging, but at the end of the

week we made new friends and made a difference in the families that were displaced by the storm," Bryant said.

SWU team members helped repair homes located in Queens and on Coney Island. Also, Dave Tolan and his son, Joshua, along with Henderson, prepared more than 100 food bags that were given to many Brooklyn families. New Hope Wesleyan Church in Brooklyn, N.Y., hosted the SWU team.



MCWHERTER NAMED NEW VP FOR DEVELOPMENT

Dr. Lisa McWherter has assembled more than 20 years of leadership experience serving at the axis of higher education and business.

"Dr. McWherter will bring an outstanding level of understanding for development and a proven



track record of relationship building that will dramatically move Southern Wesleyan forward," said Dr. Todd Voss, university president. "Her work ethic and mission fit are incredible assets for our Development team. McWherter has served as the president of the Tennessee Council for Resource Development and was the southern regional director for the Council for Resource Development.

McWherter has served as an instructor at Vanderbilt University; a member of a National Think Tank with The Gallup Organization regarding higher education and workforce issues; project director for Anderson, Oconee and Pickens County OneStop Workforce Centers with ResCare Workforce Services; a branch manager for Randstad Staffing Services; an Olympic venue manager and a United States Olympic Ambassador at the 1996 Games.

McWherter serves on various area boards which include Nurse-Family Partnership, The Rotary Club of Anderson and she serves as the Chairman of AlignSC. She is a certified shelter manager with the Red Cross and a volunteer with a number of other community agencies.

She holds a B.S. in business administration from the University of Tennessee; an MBA from Middle Tennessee State University; and an Ed.D. in Higher Education Administration from the Peabody College of Vanderbilt University. McWherter is an alumna of the Harvard Business School as a graduate of the General Management Program and recently returned from Shanghai, China to attend Harvard Business School's Executive Renewal Program. She is also a quarterly contributor to the HBS Alumni Bulletin magazine and serves as a GMP class officer.

She and her husband, Dr. Douglas Hanner, and their three children live in Anderson.

McWherter will assume her new post at SWU Aug. 1.

SWU UNVEILS NEW ATHLETIC LOGO

The Southern Wesleyan University Department of Athletics is pleased to announce and showcase the new Warrior Athletics logo for use in all the athletic programs and throughout the campus community.

"We are thankful to have this process concluded, so that we are able to continue to push forward in our move to the NCAA," commented SWU Director of Athletics, Chris Williams.

"We wanted to make sure that we honored our past, but also show that we are moving our university even closer to a 'One-Body' theme."

After an extensive research and development process that included an on-campus committee, a branding firm and the SWU marketing team, the new Warriors logo emphasizes a cross located on a helmet. The cross is the symbol that is always to be associated with SWU and the Christ-centered focus.

"We are Warriors for Christ in all that we do," continued Williams. "The helmet signifies strength and character, while the cross will always be our guide here at SWU."

SWU made application to the NCAA on Feb. 1 and has received conference sponsorship from Conference Carolinas, a NCAA Division II conference.



ATHLETICS

NCAA UPDATE

The process of transitioning Warrior Athletics into NCAA Division II took another big step forward with a site visit April 15 from a representative of the NCAA. SWU Director of Athletics Chris Williams reports the site visit was a positive one and that the representative was impressed by the showing of SWU Blue across the campus community. Williams stated that the NCAA membership committee should arrive at a final decision this July.

NEW SOFTBALL FIELD HOUSE

The Southern Wesleyan softball program cut the ribbon April 10 on the newest addition to Varsity Field. With members of the SWU board of trustees in attendance, President Todd Voss, Head Softball Coach Anna Ball, and Director of Athletics Chris Williams, cut the ribbon on a new locker room, concessions and public restroom facilities. Plans to add a press box on the home dugout on the third base line are scheduled for construction before the 2014 season.



DRIVING RANGE UPDATE

Southern Wesleyan's new driving range is now 90 percent complete. Recently, the range received a final seeding of grass in general landing zones. Two of the natural grass tee boxes are mature as well as the five target greens. Williams notes that SWU will have the premier driving range in the area, adding that it will be open to the public. Additionally, Williams notes that the new driving range will give the men's and women's golf teams an NCAA Division I-style practice facility. The driving range is projected to open by this summer.

NEW TRACK/SOCCER FACILITY

With financial goals met, heavy equipment started moving at the site along the main entrance of the Central campus April 22, clearing trees and moving earth in preparation for the \$1 million facility that will include a state-of-the-art track and soccer field. A second phase will include lights, scoreboard and bleachers. SWU Athletics hopes to have the track and soccer field usable by the end of August.





NCAA COMPLIANCE EDUCATION

The SWU athletic department has launched an online rules education resource for compliance. The free course, offered through Udemy.com, is designed to educate coaches, students-athletes, faculty, staff and the SWU community on the rules and regulations of the NCAA conference and Southern Wesleyan University. NEW COACHES

WOMEN'S SOCCER

Corey Morrell will be the next head women's soccer coach for the Warriors. Most recently, he served as the assistant coach for the Warrior men's soccer team,



helping lead the team to their best finish ever at 15-3-2 and a Top-25 NAIA National Ranking at no. 22 in the final postseason poll. During the season, SWU achieved their highest ever national ranking at no. 11. Morrell has served as a high school soccer coach at nearby D.W. Daniel High School and played at Anderson University, serving as team captain in 1997. He scored 21 goals and had 9

assists in 34 career games at Anderson. Following his time with the Trojans, Morrell graduated with his B.S. in business management in 2000 from Clemson University. He is married to Summer and they have three children, ages 7, 3, and 1.

TRACK AND FIELD

Greg Thiel was named to coach the new women's and men's track and field programs, which will begin competition

track and field programs, which will this fall. Formerly head coach of the University of South Florida's track and field program, Thiel is excited about the challenge of building a new program at SWU and seeing how God uses the sport to impact the lives of the students and the community for Christ. He has a wide-range of administration and coaching experience and led USF's Women's Cross Country Team to All-Academic Honors from 2002-2005. Thiel was also named



Conference USA Coach of the Year for Outdoor Track and Field and has coached 11 NCAA All-Americans, a Bronze Medalist at the Indoor World Championships, 67 NCAA qualifiers, and five student-athletes who competed in several Olympic games. Most recently, Thiel was athletic director at Calvary Christian High School. He has also guided the athletics programs of The Cambridge School and Northside Christian Academy. He is married and has three children.

TENNIS

Darrell Jernigan was named head coach of SWU's first women's and men's tennis teams, which will begin playing this fall. Jernigan has extensive coaching experience in the tennis field, serving as the Clemson University women's tennis assistant coach from 2005 until 2010. He has been a high school tennis coach at Stephens County (Ga.) and West Oak high schools. During his coaching career, Jernigan's girl's and boy's teams at West Oak won

Skyline 2A region championships and he was named the 2004 2A Skyline Region Coach of the Year. At Clemson, the Tigers won the 2007 ACC Regular Season Championship, followed by a 2008 ACC Tournament Championship win. He was also named 2008 ITA Southeast Women's Assistant Coach of the Year. Clemson advanced to the NCAA Sweet 16 four straight years during Jernigan's time with the Tigers. He was able to coach



five All-Americans, five All-ACC honorees, and six ACC Individual Champions at Clemson. Jernigan is currently a Biology teacher at Seneca High School in Seneca, S.C.

COMPASSION MOTIVATES SWU GRADUATE'S WORK

A compassion for children led Steve Shiflet, a 1983 Southern Wesleyan University business graduate, to Connie Maxwell Children's Home at Greenwood.

Shiflet learned about the opening for an accountant at Connie Maxwell from the choir director at his hometown church, Southside Baptist in Anderson. Shiflet feels blessed that God placed him where he could combine his accounting experience transferring from Anderson University, which was then a two-year college.

"Central Wesleyan College (now Southern Wesleyan University) was just up the road. I heard about it and applied," Shiflet said, adding that he appreciated the personal attention his professors gave him. He was also able to transfer all of his course credits.

A ministry of the South Carolina Baptist Convention, Connie Maxwell was established in 1892 through a generous gift of Dr. J.C. Maxwell and his wife, Sarah, who lost their seven-year-old daughter, Connie, to scarlet fever. To honor her memory, the Maxwells gave South Carolina Baptists more than 480 acres and willed their estate to be used in starting this ministry for children. Connie Maxwell gets funding from the Cooperative Program of the Southern Baptist Church, donations from churches and gifts from individuals with a heart for children. They also have an endowment.

Beyond the Greenwood campus, Connie Maxwell also has a campus in Orangeburg with two cottages housing up to 16 children. They also have group homes in the Simpsonville/Mauldin area as well as in Florence and Chesterfield.

"We want to keep families together if at all possible," he said, adding that Connie Maxwell also offers assistance through their higher education program.

"We recently started a program to help single parents get back on their feet. We have a parent and children living in one of our houses on campus," Shiflet said. "When someone has fallen on hard times, we're helping them get a GED or find a job." "We try to make it as much like home as possible. Cottage parents live with the children and are there 24-7," said Shiflet, adding that different groups of cottage parents rotate on a schedule.



and his love for working with children. He is close to completing three decades of service to Connie Maxwell and currently serves as their vice president for business.

As a student, Shiflet was looking for a Christian college to continue his higher education after

Connie Maxwell's acreage includes a farm with cattle and a garden. The farm originally produced food for the home, but in recent years has become an outdoor classroom. While students can work on the farm, they can also take advantage of a camplike setting that includes dorms housing 12-15 people, a kitchen and a bath house.

Connie Maxwell also has a church on its campus, which is also attended by people from the surrounding community. Connie Maxwell alumni

are active and there are reunions every other year, which are well-attended.

"We've had a lot of successful alumni in many walks of life. Some have become lawyers and educators," Shiflet said. "We keep pretty good contact with our alumni."

COLUMBIA STUDENT DISCOVERS REWARDS, CHALLENGES WORKING WITH CHILDREN

It took quite a few years for Stacey Hunter to discover her calling. Now, she knows where she's going and she is taking steps to fulfill some personal goals.

Hunter, a human services student at Southern Wesleyan University's Columbia education center, worked in the travel and hospitality industry, then traveled across the nation and overseas as an Army wife. When her husband Timothy retired from the military, the Hunters settled in Columbia.

"A friend told me I should work in the area in which God called me, which was working with children," she said. After a time of prayer, she began working for Richland School District 2 as a substitute teacher, where she eventually became a TA/ABA line therapist with Lake Carolina Elementary School, working with special needs students—specifically those with autism.

Hunter learns something new every day, such as how to adapt to their world and their way of thinking. Another challenge she encounters is safeguarding the children from danger.

"An autistic group is very busy. They tend to find things to do and get into that could cause danger to themselves and many others," she said. Challenging a misconception that autistic children have no feelings, Hunter contends that, although they might have the same internal issues, they are individuals who are not alike.

Hunter was considering a return to the classroom for a new degree, and began researching colleges and universities when she heard an ad for SWU and decided to contact them.


"They had everything I was looking for in a program – schedule assistance and classroom size. All of the chips fell into place," Hunter said. "I enjoy the prayers right before class starts. The professors are great to work with."

After graduation, Hunter hopes to work fulltime in a Christian ministry devoted to teaching children.


